13–16 September 2017




Moving Memories, our title and main theme, refers to memories generated across space and time, both local and national, as well as cross-cultural and international. It also refers to memories which have emotional impact on listeners: remembering which moves us to laughter or tears.

The theme draws on some of the new directions in oral history that address: the impact of migration and asylum-seeking around the world; as well as the exchange between narrator and listener that is 'memory work', or the emotional labour that is involved in memory practices such as oral history.

# An introduction to oral history: key principles that everyone should know

Friday 21 April 2017, 11:00 am to 1:00 pm

Jointly presented by Oral History NSW and the Royal Australian Historical Society, this talk introduces historians of all kinds to the possibilities and pitfalls of 'making memories' or doing oral history interviews with people about their experiences of the past. It asks why oral histories matter as an historical source, and explores the various ways in which they can be used. Come along and hear Oral History NSW President **Anisa Puri** and Vice-President **Scott McKinnon**, discuss the value of oral history and share examples from their own work.



Anisa Puri is a professional historian, heritage consultant, and the President of Oral History NSW. Anisa has worked on large-scale national oral history projects—she managed the Australian Generations Oral History Project from 2012-2015, and is currently involved with the HIV/AIDS Volunteers History Project. Her first book, Australian Lives: An Intimate History (with Professor Alistair Thomson) features interviews

from the Australian Generations Collection and will be published by Monash University Press in 2017.



Scott McKinnon is a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at Western Sydney University, Vice President of Oral History NSW and President of Sydney's Pride History Group. An experienced oral historian, Scott has conducted several projects investigating the history of the Sydney LGBT community and he has written and recorded an oral history podcast series, PridePod. His first book, Gay Men at the Movies: Cinema, memory and the history of a gay male community was published by Intellect Books in November 2016.

From LGBTI radio to social movement





# The Antelope A journal of oral history and mayhem




# Oral history and empathy at the Women's March on Washington

# A Cultural History of Sound, Memory and the Senses

# Joy Damousi & Paula Hamilton (Eds)

Routledge, 2017

The past 20 years have witnessed a turn towards the sensuous, particularly the aural, as a viable space for critical exploration in History and other Humanities disciplines. This has been informed by a heightened awareness of the role that the senses play in shaping modern identity and understanding of place; and increasingly, how the senses are central to the memory of past experiences and their representation.

The result has been a broadening of our historical imagination, which has previously taken the visual for granted and ignored the other senses. Considering how crucial the auditory aspect of life has been, a shift from seeing to hearing past societies offers a further perspective for examining the complexity of historical events and experiences. Historians in many fields have begun to listen to the past, developing new arguments about the history and the memory of sensory experience.

This volume builds on scholarship produced over the last twenty years and explores these dimensions by coupling the history of sound and the senses in distinctive ways: through a study of the sound of violence; the sound of voice mediated by technologies and the expression of memory through the senses. Though sound is the most developed field in the study of the sensorium, many argue that each of the senses should not be studied in isolation from each other, and for this reason, the final section incorporates material which emphasizes the sense as relational. # Making Mosul Great Again An oral history "deployment" to Iraq

Read **HERE** about an article written by **Stephanie Boyle**, Senior Curator of Film and Photographs at the Australian War Memorial, for an upcoming issue of the AWM's magazine, about her oral history "deployment" to Iraq last year. It will be a highly informative study of the reality of conditions on the ground in Iraq and the remarkable challenges faced by Australians training Iraqi forces, with many interesting and revealing quotes. Some extracts:

"There's a degree of empathy you need to have and be able to put yourselves in their shoes. Their 75th Brigade drove 360km through Daesh-held areas in 24 hours, to get **here**, for training. They still have to draw pay and give it to their families. They don't get paid by electronic funds, they need to literally go home and give the money to their families." (Chris)

. . .

"It seemed to me that the members of 7RAR had indeed remained calm in difficult times, adapting to highly demanding conditions and sharing the Iraqi resolve to defeat the 'scourge of Daesh'. By the time my group of 7RAR guys and girls returned home, they had overcome the fatigue of long hours in the heat, exercised their ingenuity and emotional intelligence, and trained a record number 9,000 Iraqi soldiers in six months. Back in Adelaide, I asked my last question. 'Would you go back to Iraq?'. I asked Adam. He replied:

'I wouldn't avoid coming back. I got things to do back home, but this is where soldiers live. We live to work, to serve our country. Inshallah, as they say.' '?'
