

Dr Evans' last book Swimming with the Spit, 100 years of the Spit Amateur Swimming Club was a community history written to encourage readers and swimmers, young and old, to think about their ambles down to the beach, their invigorating swims and refreshing afternoon dips on sultry Sydney-summer days and crisp winter mornings, with an eye on their history. Passion for a sport in the present can overshadow its fascinating past.

This talk will reveal how feminist oral histories of the Spit Club's female swimming champions were used to trace the ways in which swimming and its historical meanings have changed for women in twentieth-century Australia. It reveals the lack of cultural scripts local female swimming stars could call upon to narrate their life stories and sporting success, the different ways in which they want their lives

remembered and how historians might approach the complex construction of these histories when writing public history and trying to share authority in the process.

Dr Tanya Evans is a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Modern History at Macquarie University. She is a public historian who specializes in the social and cultural history of the family. She is passionate about researching ordinary people and places in the past and incorporating ordinary people and places in the process of her research and the construction of historical knowledge.

Her first three books were about the history of 'illegitimacy', poverty and philanthropy. Fractured Families: Life on the Margins in Colonial New South Wales (2015) was about Australia's oldest surviving charity, the Benevolent Society, and she wrote this in collaboration with family historians. This won the NSW Premier's History Prize for Community and Regional history last year.

Workshop leaders will be **Pauline Curby**, an experienced oral historian; and **Andrew Host**, whose 35 years of experience as a sound engineer can help you get quality recordings that will stand the test of time. Both are members of Oral History NSW.

Pauline Curby has worked as a freelance professional historian since the early 1990s and has undertaken consultancies in oral history, environmental history and heritage, as well as writing a number of commissioned histories. Her publication, *Randwick* won the NSW Premier's Award (Regional and Community History), 2010.

Pauline is the recipient of the NSW History Fellowship, 2011 and is a member of the Professional Historians Association (NSW & ACT).

Andrew Host has been professionally immersed in audio for 36 years, starting in commercial radio in Sydney, and then working a further 16 years in independent recording studios in the advertising industry.

In 1998, Andrew moved into Compact Disc and DVD duplication, which also involved restoration of old audio and video. Since 2010, Andrew's focus has been on audio preservation and enhancement.

Andrew has been a member of Oral History NSW since 2012, and has been on the executive committee since 2013 where he now serves as Treasurer.



The art of storytelling

No matter which form you tell your digital story in, it's the detail that makes it memorable. During our first session, City Historian, Dr Lisa Murray, will introduce you to historical archive collections and support you in researching your topic of interest. You'll also get familiar with intellectual property and copyright before learning some digital tools.

Digital manipulation

Learn basic digital media skills using iMovie and GarageBand (N.B:. these are Apple products). Focusing on how to edit and manipulate content, these workshops cover image, audio and video components. Get an education in digital making tools, supported by a skilled facilitator, then, let loose and record your own stories. Suitable for adults and families, these free sessions are limited to 10 people per workshop, so bookings are essential. Mac laptops are available for use upon registration.



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

Revamped Historical Atlas of Sydney launched

In case you hadn't already heard, The City of Sydney launched its revamped Historical Atlas of Sydney in May of this year. It's now easier to access historical maps and research the city's changing boundaries with the new online **Historical Atlas of Sydney**.



More than 500 maps show streets, buildings, roads and public spaces from 1833 to 1972, making the atlas an important resource for City staff and the public.

The maps can be viewed on computer, tablet or phone. You can also download them free of charge for personal, professional or study purposes.



Quote: "At the 2014 OHA Annual Meeting, the African American Oral History Program at Story For All received the prestigious Vox Populi Award, one of the highest honours in the oral history world. Today on the blog we hear from Angela Zusman, the project's Founder and Executive Director, about the inspiration for her work, as well as successes and lessons learned. Story For All has achieved important victories, building coalitions with local partners and officials that promote shared understanding and meaningful change."

EXTRACT: "Can you describe what a typical 'Story For All' project or workshop looks like? What is it about your approach that makes it unique?

"At Story For All, our goal is to expose disenfranchised communities to the power of oral history for the purpose of healing, building skills, elevating an authentic narrative, and ultimately transforming communities and systems through policy reform. We do this by training community members in oral history methodology, then supporting them in recording, archiving, and reflecting on their own communities' stories and wisdom through art, dialogue, policy recommendations, and public presentations.

"Our process was designed with the understanding that the sharing of stories through oral history has multiple beneficial impacts, especially for historically marginalized communities whose stories, values, and cultures have been subsumed by the often-negative narratives promoted by the dominant culture. As stories have been weaponized to use against such communities, our narrative change approach is literally a method for individuals and communities to take back their story, as well as their culture. Additionally, by supporting communities in documenting their own stories, we create a culture of storytellers, like the *griots* of West Africa. Instead of the stories and wisdom being extracted from the community, they reside within the hearts and minds of present and future community leaders."


CITY SYDNEY (a) Voices of Millers Point

The voices of Millers Point paint vivid pictures of the past. In 2005 the Department of Housing undertook a large oral history project with tenants and residents in Millers Point. Here the memories of Alice Brown and Des Gray are combined with historic photographs of Millers Point.



The collection of interviews with a priest, shopkeeper, waterside workers, a former Builders Labourers Federation unionist, the children of a publican and others, reveal fascinating and colourful stories about the Millers Point community over the past 100 years. The original recordings were produced by oral historian Frank Heimans, long-term

member of Oral History NSW, who said the interviewees had a strong sense of allegiance and belonging to the heritage-listed area. "The residents have a rich reservoir of memories of living at Millers Point, going, in some cases, as far back as six generations," Mr Heimans said of the project. Read more HERE.




Voice of the Bush. A history of ABC Rural 1945–2015
