- Oral History Association of Australia (now known as Oral History Australia): President, Western Australian Branch, 1982-1984 and 1993-1996. Foundation Member, since 1978.


Master's program: Oral History-Contemporary History (Prague)




The Voice of the Past: Oral History now in fourth Edition

Oxford University Press 2017

The Voice of the Past, a foundational text in the field of Anglophone oral history, has been thoroughly updated to encompass a more global scope of oral history research traditions, and to reflect the many advances logged by oral historians in the 21st century. First published in 1978, with second and third editions published in 1988 and 2000, The Voice of the Past features major revisions and additions in its newly published fourth edition. These are composed not only by Paul Thompson, but also by the volume's new co-author Joanna Bornat. (The book also features a short new chapter on oral history theory by guest-contributor Lynn Abrams.)

- The ADA At 25, a project completed in 2015, marked the 25th anniversary of the signing of the Americans With Disabilities Act, interviewing disability rights activists about their struggle for accessibility.
- The Last Sardine Cannery includes conversations with workers, managers, and fishing boat captains who worked in the sardine industry in Maine
 - Immigrant Voices includes interviews with new Mainers.

Australian Centre for Public History's 2018 Annual Lecture was a great success






Changing places: from the garden of England to the Australian desert

What is it like to grow up in the rolling green hills of the Kent countryside in England, only to spend several years as an adult working in the Australian desert?

It is hard to imagine two settings more different in climate, vegetation, wildlife and colour palette.

Some of the people I interviewed for the Life in Woomera Oral History Project spent their childhoods in England, then moved to Woomera to work on the rocket range or to accompany a spouse who was working there. — Sally Stephenson



Well the early childhood in Dover of course – the big white cliffs, the rolling hills of the South Downs, small woods. We had a small one next to our garden and it was full of hazelnut trees so we used to in hazelnut season go in there and harvest, and chestnuts – used to harvest those as well, and horse chestnuts of course. ...

So in winter time of course it changed, because unlike Australia where the trees are – don't drop their leaves on an annual basis – in England every tree except the yew tree and the holly tree in autumn time, which was beautiful – all the colours.

What then was Tony's impression of Woomera?
