#### Inquiry launched into Canberra's museums, galleries after funding, staff cuts


"A federal inquiry will probe Canberra's national museum and galleries as they grapple with millions of dollars in funding cuts, forcing them to find new revenue and raising fears that government neglect could leave them forgotten. Budget cuts hitting the ACT's national institutions since the Coalition's ascent to power in 2013 have been estimated at \$30 million, and directors working with shrinking public funding have had to slash staff over multiple years."

# The Voice of the Past: Oral History now in fourth Edition

Oxford University Press 2017

The Voice of the Past, a foundational text in the field of Anglophone oral history, has been thoroughly updated to encompass a more global scope of oral history research traditions, and to reflect the many advances logged by oral historians in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. First published in 1978, with second and third editions published in 1988 and 2000, The Voice of the Past features major revisions and additions in its newly published fourth edition. These are composed not only by Paul Thompson, but also by the volume's new co-author Joanna Bornat. (The book also features a short new chapter on oral history theory by guest-contributor Lynn Abrams.)

#### The Last Slave

In 1931, Zora Neale Hurston sought to publish the story of Cudjo Lewis, the final slave-ship survivor. Instead it languished in a vault. Until now.

Barracoon is testament to her patient fieldwork. The book is based on three months of periodic interviews with a man named Cudjo Lewis – or Kossula, his original name – the last survivor of the last slave ship to land on American shores. Plying him with peaches and Virginia hams, watermelon and Bee Brand insect

powder, Hurston drew out his story. Kossula had been captured at age 19 in an area now known as the country Benin by warriors from the neighbouring Dahomian tribe, then marched to a stockade, or barracoon, on the West African coast. There, he and some 120 others were purchased and herded onto the *Clotilda*, captained by William Foster and commissioned by three Alabama brothers, to make the 1860 voyage.
